
Treasurers Report

The audited financial reports provided by GJ Norton & Co show Beaumaris Basketball Club achieving a surplus of \$6,483.

This surplus is a decrease on previous seasons, which reflects the club's policy to hold fees at the same level for at least the past 4 years, while costs have risen. The introduction of a coaching mentor and the wider application of coaching refunds have been increased expenses, which will be regular expenses going forward.

After receiving notification from the Southern Basketball Association regarding their decision to increase scoresheet fees from Winter 2019 season to help fund the construction of new courts and withdrawal of early payment discounts, it appears inevitable there will be a substantial increase in players fees charged going forward.

As at 30 June, our bank balances amount to \$109,496, with the only liability being June quarter GST.

Independence


In conducting our audit, we followed applicable independence requirements of Australian Professional ethical pronouncements.
